To be successful

In order to be successful in this class, students will need to adhere to the following:

- -Be present. Not just physically, but also mentally. This means keeping your cell phone away unless we're using it. Pay attention when being given instruction. Understand that time is a currency, so be aware of what you're spending it on.
- -Participate! We will be in groups a lot in this class, and it makes everything more enjoyable when you are engaged with those around you.
- -Get lots of sleep. As a high schooler, you should be getting 8 hours per night. We'll discuss why in the class! :)

Student Responsibilities

Work should be a reflection of an individual student's ideas- not that of their friend or the internet. Receiving/providing answers for an assignment, essay, quiz, or test is cheating and academic dishonesty—regardless of its form. This includes any student looking up answers online or using a chat bot to do their work for them. Any such action will result in an automatic zero, and possible referral to the office. If it happens more than once, the student may be dropped from the class with an "F" on their transcript.

Cell phones should be put away, out of sight and out of mind.

Be respectful of others. You are free to disagree and share your opinion, but that does not extend to personal insults or attacks. Discussions in my class are just that-discussions of ideas, not people.

Free expression does not extend to unrestricted language. Use good judgement and don't use profanity in my room or anywhere on campus.

Late work

All assignments are expected to be completed on time. If a student has an excused absence that was called in by a parent (such as an illness, family vacation, etc.), they are given the same number of days to complete the assignment as they were absent. (Ex: If you were out sick for three days, you have an extra three days to complete the assignment). If the absence was unexcused, it will be counted as late.

I do accept late work, but at a penalty. If it is received within a week of the due date, a 25% deduction will occur. If it is past two weeks, you will receive up to half credit. Note: Even then, it's still worth doing. 50% is far better than 0%!

Assessments and Assignments

Students will complete assessments during each unit of study to assess their understanding. Students will complete the CUSD Common Final at the end of the first and second semesters. The Common Final will count for 20% of the student's final semester grade in grades 9-12 and 10% in grades 7-8 (some exceptions may apply at the Junior High level). Common finals will be in ELA, Math, Science, Social Science, and World Language.

Final exams will be given during the CUSD Jr High/High School Early Dismissal days in December and May, as identified on the District Calendar.

If students are requested to participate in a survey, the survey questions will be provided to parents/guardians seven days before student contact.
