Student Responsibilities

Technology:

With the 1:1 technology initiative, it is the responsibility of the student to bring their fully charged laptop to school every day. Technology is a tool no different than a pencil. Like all school supplies, students are expected to have the supplies needed to learn. Cell Phones/Headphones:

In an effort to limit distractions in the classroom, Casteel has adopted a no cell phones or headphones in the classroom policy. Each classroom has a cell phone holder where students are expected to drop off their devices during class. Discipline will follow the following protocols if a student does not follow this policy.

Discipline Protocol:

It is the expectation that students hold themselves to high standards. The teacher will address students who are not meeting these expectations. Typical classroom behaviors consequences these are they standard progression for discipline

Our goal is to work with families to ensure that all students have a safe and focused learning environment.

Tardy Protocol:

Students are expected to be in their seats when the bell rings and ready to learn. If a student is tardy to class teachers will follow this progress to rectify students being late to class.

a warning on their first and second offense.

the teacher will email / call home.

Notify the Attendance Interventionist and email / call home.

On the fifth offense, the teacher will refer the student to our Attendance Interventionist, who can work with families and assign Saturday school if necessary.

The teacher has the option to provide their own lunch detention at their discretion instead of writing a conduct referral.

Absences:

Students who have an excused absences have at least one day every day they are absent to make up the work they missed. Excessive absences can result in the loss of a credit for the course. Food and Drink:

There is no food or drink allowed in the classroom except water. Finals:

Finals are not given early. Absent students will receive a zero until they can take ACADEMIC INTEGRITY:

Homework, tests, papers and projects are all designed to increase your competence and understanding in history and the social sciences. Use of somebody else's homework, test answers, or paper/ project (plagiarism) is a matter of serious consequence. The unethical copying of another's homework assignment will result in a grade of "0" on that assignment for both parties involved. Any student found cheating on a quiz or a test, or plagiarizing on a paper or project from either a published source, or another student's work, will receive a grade of "0" on that assignment without the possibility of making up the work. Your parent(s) will also be notified.

Please note that this is a hard boundary in this class. I turn on the plagiarism checker for all assignments, and I do review that for each submitted assignment.

Expectations of Students:

Students will be expected to conduct themselves properly in class. Unreasonable disturbances or

destruction to property will result in student/teacher discussion. Further problems will be referred to administrators and/or parents.

Use the entire block of time we have together. Contribute to class discussions. Thinking and sharing your ideas with others WILL help you understand material.

Take care of business in a timely and focused manner. When your boss says something needs to be on his or her desk at a certain time, it needs to be on his or her desk at that time.

Take care of the room, keeping it neat and clean during your time here. Do not leave empty cups, bottles, etc. on the floor for me to pick up.

Be flexible and follow directions, even if they change. Things happen, so directions and deadlines may adjust periodically.

Be kind and respectful to me, your classmates, and any visitors in class including substitute teachers. Trust me; your life is MUCH easier when you make others' lives easy.

Be honest and deal with problems right away. I'm VERY trusting, until it is violated.

Be responsible for your own work. Copying is the easy way out, and is reflected in assessment grades. You will do your best work. Don't be afraid to try, even if you fail.

This class is required for graduation. It is only one semester in length, so please take your grades seriously. You don't have the whole year to bring up mistakes made in the first quarter.

Late work

Late work will be accepted up until the last Friday before grading windows close.

Assessments and Assignments

Students will complete assessments during each unit of study to assess their understanding. Students will complete the CUSD Common Final at the end of the first and second semesters. The Common Final will count for 20% of the student's final semester grade in grades 9-12 and 10% in grades 7-8 (some exceptions may apply at the Junior High level). Common finals will be in ELA, Math, Science, Social Science, and World Language.

Final exams will be given during the CUSD Jr High/High School Early Dismissal days in December and May, as identified on the <u>District Calendar</u>.

If students are requested to participate in a survey, the survey questions will be provided to parents/guardians seven days before student contact.
