### **Capitalization Rules**

### **<u>Rule #1</u>**: Capitalize names of people and things.

- Example: George Washington; Canada; Dr. Pepper; the Rocky Mountains; World War II; Gulf of Mexico

### Rule #2: Capitalize important words in titles of books, movies, etc.

- Example: A Tale of Two Cities; Revenge of the Teenage Vixens from Outer Space

### **<u>Rule #3</u>**: Capitalize the first letter of a sentence or quote.

- Example: My mother said, "Your father will be home shortly."

# <u>Rule #4</u>: Capitalize names that indicate family relationship when used with the person's name or alone as the name you call that person.

- Example: Aunt Karen; Mom; Grandmother; Dad

## <u>Rule #5</u>: Capitalize a title that precedes a name or alone as the name you call that person.

- Example: Governor Smith; Mister; Doctor Brown

### <u>Rule #6</u>: Capitalize countries, nationalities, and languages.

- Example: England, English, American; Spain, Spanish

#### \*Examples of words that are <u>not</u> capitalized:

### Seasons: winter, spring, summer, autumn

General studies or subjects: **history, art, science**, etc. (except <u>specific</u> studies, subjects, or languages: Latin, Algebra II)
