6.02 <u>Superintendent Current Events</u>

Mr. Narducci stated that it has been his pleasure to work with the Student Body Presidents this year! Since this is the last report while school is in session, there is much to celebrate.

Congratulations to Cameron Bautista from Basha High School and Carol Chen from Hamilton High School who have won the prestigious Flinn Scholarship. These CUSD students are two of 20 Arizona high-school seniors awarded the 2023 Flinn Scholarship, a merit-based award that will provide each of them a full ride to one of Arizona's public universities. Carol will be attending the University of Arizona and Cameron will be attending Arizona State University with the goal of obtaining a degree in Political Science and Mathematics. Chandler Unified was well represented throughout the entire Flinn Scholarship process. Twelve CUSD students were named Flinn semifinalists earlier this year.

Today Chandler High held a very special ceremony for the students who were the first black students to fully integrate into the school in 1949. School segregation wasn't outlawed in Arizona until 1953. The following year, the landmark U.S. Supreme Court case, *Brown vs. Board of Education*, would pave the way for schools across America to end segregation. The students included Willie and his sister Joella Arbuckle and Robert and his sister Artie MaeTurner of whom Willie Arbuckle and Robert Turner became the first black students to graduate from CHS in 1951. In addition, the Woods, Payne, Folley and Jackson families who also were early pioneers of Chandler and attended Chandler High School during this time. It was such an honor to share with our current students and Chandler High School Community how their school has made history locally and nationally. A big Thank you to Mr. Shaun Mitchell and Mr. Michael Franklin along with the staff at the Chandler City Museum for assisting with this honor at Chandler High School.

This weekend several big championship games will be played. We have team's hopeful of a title in baseball with Basha, Casteel and Hamilton in the running, softball with Basha and Perry in the running, boys volleyball Casteel and Perry in the running., and actually in the "running" track and field will be crowning State Champions this weekend at Mesa Community College. We already have an early Championship reported as Casteel beat Hamilton 17-10 to win the girls' flag football state championship under the coaching of Rae Black! In about three months or so, these teams will be back at it to participate in the first-ever AIA sanctioned season for girls' flag football!

Another first to celebrate with you...our first-ever state championship title in the AIA E-sports competition. Hamilton High School captured the state title, winning the Super Smash Brothers and League of Legends tournaments. The Hamilton High Esports program is sponsored by language arts teacher Michael Oei. Congratulations to our students and coach.

The Chandler Education Foundation has rewarded more than \$172,000 to graduating seniors this year. Scholarship breakfasts, catered by school culinary classes, provided the chance for donors to meet recipients and their families. In addition to donor scholarships, the Foundation funds IMPACT scholarships through the annual Winner's Choice Car or Cash Raffle. This year, \$75,000 in IMPACT scholarships were awarded to students who demonstrated an impact on their community and a commitment to academics, attendance, and community service.

I'm pleased to report that our own Colleen Flannery, Chief Technology Officer was nominated and became a finalist in the Enterprise Category of the 2023 ORBIE awards. This award recognizes the best of the best at the executive and chief level of information technology. Under Colleen's leadership, technology and systems within Chandler Unified have been transformed to better serve our students and staff! Thank you, Colleen, for all you have done and continue to do to keep CUSD future focused. Dr. Craig Gilbert was named Administrator of the Year by the Chamber of Commerce. Last week, Galveston celebrated its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Last but certainly not least, we are celebrating our educators and nurses this week. Today is school nurse day and this week is educator appreciation week. It is no secret that the past few years have been challenging for both groups. Yet our staff and nurses come to school EVERY day for our students, and it shows. The difference you make is seen and felt across the district and we thank you for everything! Governing Board members and the public, my ask of you is when you see a CUSD educator, nurse, or health assistant please take a moment to personally thank them. Those words really do go a long way!

Heather Caviar, Director of Finance, conducted a public hearing on the revised 2022-2023 budget, reviewing the overall revenue loss, impact to M&O/Capital budget, Federal stimulus update, and outlined the changes from Budget Revision #1 to Revision #2.

### 9. Comments

#### 9.01 <u>Citizen Comments</u>

Jennifer Alvey - Transparency - Asked for greater transparency to re-establish trust. Requested the board vote to support proposals that encourage greater public oversight from the CUSD Board. Also publicly asked for a response to the FOYA request delivered March 31st, with follow-up emails on April 2nd and 4th regarding the decision-making and accountability process for the March 27th inservice meeting. Requesting a response or a minimum of when a response can be expected.

*Brett Wingate* - Transparency - 393 students chose an alternative to CUSD. We have a partnership beginning with the Parents Bill of Rights. Right to direct education, access all records, direct the upbringing, the moral and religious training, and make healthcare decisions. Parents have the right to review learning materials and activities in advance. Parents have the right to consent.

*Katie McPherson* - Supporting Police and Children - Echoed partnership comments expressed this evening. Read statement from Queen Creek Police confirming Officer Lines was in meeting at CCHS. Police investigations should be done in tandem with administration. Kids are being abused and power is being used against children. Children must have their dignity upheld too.

*Lisa Calderon* - TAW - Read statement used at the State Board of Education earlier this month. Discussed concerns regarding accountability on the ESA Voucher Program. Requested to be involved in superintendent search. Thank You to educators, support staff and administrators.

Stephanie Martinez - ASBA priorities - Thanked educators for supporting and preparing future generations. Asked the board to reconsider the political priorities from ASBA, the same that have been presented for years. Mental well-being is a top priority, yet it is not one of the top seven priorities to ASBA. Requested the board modify their top priorities to elevate the message of mental health.

Zenya Pruzhanovsky- Mental Health - This is a crisis affecting community. She remembered a PHS sophomore who lost life due to mental illness. Requested the District tackle the stigma attached to suicide and asked the District offer grief counseling to families. The suicide helpline is 988.

*Dawn Shim* - LGBTQ Students - Requested the District affirm LGBTQ students and protect them because they are vulnerable to mental health crisis. The Board promised to email, but never received a response. Lack of transparency.

*Kim Mundis* - Agenda Item - Requested the Board table the superintendent contract until there is a thorough audit of CUSD's policies and procedures to determine why so many children are being failed in profoundly unforgivable ways.

## 10.04 Grades 9 through 12 Advanced Placement (AP) Chemistry Resource Adoption

An RFI was released to identify a resource that closely aligns with the most recent AP Chemistry Course and Exam Description released in 2022. The committee recommended Savvas's Chemistry: A Molecular Approach, Sixth Edition, Advanced Placement Edition, 2023 (Tro) with Modified Mastering Chemistry with Pearson eText. move forward in the textbook adoption process. The cost for a class set is \$5,984.10 including estimated tax, shipping, and processing. This includes 30 student editions, 6-year subscription to Modified Mastering with eText, Test Prep for AP Chemistry.

### 10.05 Grades 9 through 12 Phenomena in Natural Science

An RFI was released to identify a resource that closely aligns with the ADE Standards for high school Science addressed in the course. In addition, the RFI calls for resources that will complement the CUSDs one-to-one initiative. The committee recommended STEMScopes, by Accelerate Learning move forward in the adoption process. The cost is \$71,100.00 including estimated tax, shipping, and processing. This includes 6 years of access for 1,000 students per year and their teachers to STEMScopes HS Earth & Space Online, HS Physical Science Online, BBC STEMScopes Streaming Online, and the Online Assessment Package for high schools.

10.06 <u>Authorization to Exceed Fund Subsections within the Maintenance and Operations Budget</u> Recommended authorization to exceed fund subsections within the maintenance and operations budget per Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S). §15-905.G and Governing Board Policy DBJ.

Patti thanked Cameron for great presentation this evening. There are University graduations, middle and elementary promotions next week, and high school graduations the following week.
