



- Perseverance

- TIME MANAGEMENT

DAILY EXPECTATIONS

The agenda is filled out daily. Students not in class should use the teacher's

assignments.

*As a reminder, absences do not excuse students from work expectations. Students have I day, for each day absent, to make up missed work.

- Students will actively participate in whole group lessons and community activities.
- Students will complete classwork and homework as assigned.
- Teachers will contact parents when necessary

Newsletters

 Newsletters will be emailed weekly to highlight classroom information, student accomplishments and classroom successes, as well as to keep families informed of upcoming events.

GRADED WORK

- Graded work will be returned weekly.
- Students should:
 - review their graded work at home, in the event that there is a question about a grade
 - bring grade questions to the attention of the teacher ASAP
 - provide the original assignment for reference
 - keep in mind, some graded work will be: placed on display, kept in spirals, or displayed in portfolios

Students will be graded on the following grading scale:

59% - 50% = F



HOMEWORK

Students will be given homework every Monday - Thursday. Work will be reviewed in class the following day, so it is imperative that students complete it as assigned.

There are certain criteria that must be met to complete work:

- Use PENCIL only unless specified
- Submit final work
- Show all thinking for every assignment (don't assume ANYTHING)
- TRY even when unsure growth does not happen without errors

Students will also be expected to read at least 20 minutes at home daily.

Students will have additional homework or projects assigned from time to time.

However, please note:

- a majority of your child's homework will come from anything that is not finished during independent class work time.
- If you feel your child has an excessive amount of after hours homework, it could be due to lack of effort, time management and focus during the school day.
- If your child has very little homework, that could be the result of lots of hard work and on task behavior in class.

PERSONAL TECHNOLOGY (Taken directly from CUSD Handbook)

Examples of What You MAY NOT Do With Your Device at School:

Using the device at times or in places when the teacher has asked you not to use them, such as, but not limited to:
