## Family Fun

**Big Idea:** I share special times with my family. **Concepts:** Family activities, celebrations, traditions **Theme Vocabulary:** celebrate, holiday, relatives, thankful, together

#### Capacity:

For children to understand the concept of *full* and *empty*, the key words *more* and *less* are used when describing the capacity within the container. For example, *more* rice may be needed to make the container *full*. Or, *less* rice will take the container from *full* to *empty*. Then comparisons are introduced with language such as *holds more than*, and *holds less than*. This allows children opportunities to start comparative thinking about everyday objects and what they can hold.

Blocks Measure Up: Children are growing every day and are interested in affirming their own growth. In *How Tall Am I?*, the teacher compares her own height to that of a doll. She then uses a length of butcher paper on the wall to record the doll's height, her own height, and the height of each child. Children compare and contrast their height to the doll's height and the teacher's height. Who is taller? Who is shorter? Are any children the same height?
