Critical thinking and problem solving will be encouraged, along with individual and group multi-skill projects in this challenging course.

Common finals will be in ELA, Math, Science, Social Science, and World Language.

Final exams will be given during the CUSD Jr High/High School Early Dismissal days in December and May, as identified on the <u>District Calendar</u>.

Unit 6: Road to War- Global rise of Nation-States including both western and non-western states Second Semester:

Unit 7: The Great War- An examination of World War I and the inter-war period

Unit 8: Second World War-Investigation into the causes, consequences, and legacy of World War II

Unit 9: The Cold War- A study into the emergence of the Soviet Union, communist China, conflicts such as the Korean War, space race, and arms race

Unit 10: Globalization- Contemporary global issues such as terrorism, globalization, human rights, regional conflicts, population, and environmental issues
